# The piloting sessions have been implemented



We are excited to share the latest updates on our Critical Balance project as we reach a significant milestone with our piloting sessions. Our goal has been to engage at least 15 young people, aged 13-29, in each participating country, and we are pleased to report that we've been doing really well to achieve this target.

Each piloting session it has been designed to be a wide-ranging and immersive experience. Participants got a deeper insight into at least four <u>learning activities</u> covering two distinct topics, ensuring a broad and enriching educational encounter. The developed engaging <u>Pop Quiz</u> has also been included in the sessions, which not only reinforced the learning but also added an element of fun and competition.

As an extra activity in Latvia, a different target audience, namely seniors from Aizkraukle senior association, also tested the learning units connected to conspiration theories, ranking theories and took part in different tasks for identifying disinformation.

## **Hear from Our Participants in**

### Sweden

· The popquiz was fun!

- · ChatGPT is not really appreciated by some teachers, but I've heard that it is being used a lot, in school and in workplaces. I think it is a good tool, but of course you need to be cautious when fact checking is it true or not?
- · Conspiracy theories are fun to explore, but scary if some believe in them. COVID-19 (health) for example.
- · I can not believe Flat Earthers, and I wonder if they really believe it to be true or just because it is fun.
- · It was fun to discuss with other participants, about different topics
- The activities are needed, also for a younger audience. When more young people, even children, are starting to use social media TikTok, there has to be some better fact checking. Parents need to be present (needs to know about critical thinking).



#### Latvia

- Personality tests can be found on a number of popular websites, but most of the time they are all designed to attract attention to a particular website rather than to learn something new or useful about yourself
- The tasks included in this project should be in every school.

### Romania

· It's unbelievable what some can think of. Can get really frightening if you are not critical enough.

- · It is difficult to think critically in many situations, but is a must...
- · It is amazing what AI is able to generate…even though not knowing the background information can lead to sharing not valid content which is not good. Good to know what to pay attention about AI-generated content.

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### Germany
